Musical Director

Kevin Young



Kevin Young is a veteran music educator, conductor, composer, and arranger with nearly four decades of experience. A graduate of the Newcastle Conservatorium of Music, Kevin began his teaching career at Dubbo South High School, where he directed a wide range of ensembles that gained strong recognition across the Central West. His dedication to music education earned him the Citizen of the Year award in 2000.

For the past 22 years, he served as Director of Music Performance at Newcastle Grammar School, leading ensembles such as the award-winning NGS Symphony Orchestra and directing major productions including Annie, Wicked, and Anastasia. Though he stepped down from this role in 2023, classroom teaching and ensemble direction remain central to his career.

Kevin's compositional journey began with *Peregrini Fortium*, premiered on the NGS Symphony Orchestra's U.S. tour in 2013. Recognized for his melodic innovation and rhythmic complexity, Kevin has continued to compose for student ensembles, earning praise from renowned conductor George Ellis. He has collaborated with some of Australia's leading musicians and composers and has directed ensembles in national and international tours.

Now semi-retired, Kevin remains actively involved in music education teaching casually around Newcastle, as a guest conductor and tutor with the Newcastle Youth Orchestra, and as Musical Director of Orchestra Nova. His focus today lies in composition, mentorship, and fostering musical growth in the community.

Assistant Conductor

Stephen Aveling-Rowe



Stephen Aveling-Rowe is an emerging organist, conductor, and cellist. He holds an A.Mus.A. in Pipe Organ (2014) and an L.Mus.A. with Distinction in Pipe Organ (2019) from Sydney, as well as a BA with a specialization in Music from Avondale Conservatorium (2019). His musical journey began early; at 16, he started a BMus at the University of New England before transferring to Avondale Conservatorium in 2016.

Stephen has performed internationally, including concert tours in the Netherlands and the UK, study tours throughout Europe, and completed an intensive in liturgical and choral music at Cambridge.

For five years, he was principal cellist with the Newcastle Youth Orchestra, and now leads as principle cellist with the Fernleigh Orchestra, where he collaborates with Dr. Ian Cook in an informal mentorship as an occasional conductor. Having studied organ under Philip Swanton, Stephen continues to refine his musical skills. Since 2021, he has lectured in photography at Avondale University, blending his love for the arts and humanities. After pausing a Masters in Ministry, he plans to pursue a Masters in Theology, exploring the intersection of the musical arts and sacramental theology.

Concert Program

Florentiner March

Julius Fučik

Composed in 1897, the *Florentiner March* is one of Julius Fučik's most famous military marches. With lively rhythms, catchy melodies, and colourful orchestration, it captures the energy and charm of the march tradition. Brass fanfares sparkle alongside woodwind flourishes, creating a sense of pageantry and celebration. Its infectious drive and jubilant character make it a fitting tribute to the accomplishments we're here to celebrate today.

Ritual Fire Dance

Manuel de Falla

Part of de Falla's 1915 ballet *El amor brujo* (*Love, the Sorcerer*), *Ritual Fire Dance* pulses with the rhythms and intensity of Andalusian flamenco. The music evokes the drama of a midnight ritual intended to drive away a restless spirit. Castanets and driving percussion heighten the sense of urgency, while the surging momentum reflects the struggles of love and passion. Its vivid storytelling and thrilling energy bring the ritual vividly to life for the listener.

Flying Theme from *E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial*

John Williams

Composed for Steven Spielberg's film *E.T.* (1982), the *Flying Theme* captures the innocence and wonder of childhood adventures. The music represents the bond between the young boy Elliott and the alien E.T., conveying friendship, joy and the thrill of discovery. A soaring melody carried by the strings, layered with woodwinds and brass, evokes the sensation of flight and freedom. Williams' masterful orchestration creates a lush soundscape, inviting the listener to experience the magic of flight alongside the characters.

Tango: Por una Cabeza

Composer: Carlos Gardel

One of the most beloved tangos of all time, *Por una Cabeza* blends passion and melancholy. Its title, meaning "by a head," refers to a narrow loss in a horse race and serves as a metaphor for the risks and thrills of love. In numerous notable films, characters glide across the dance floor to this sweeping theme, capturing moments of drama, romance, and joyous abandon.



Mars from The Planets

Gustav Holst

Mars, the Bringer of War is the first movement of Holst's orchestral suite The Planets. Its relentless rhythms and bold harmonies evoke the menacing power of war, opening with a striking, militaristic march driven by brass and strings. Composed ~1916 and inspired by astrology and myth, Mars offers a symbolic, almost cinematic depiction of conflict. Its famous 5/4 time signature gives the piece a distinctive, unsettling momentum that sets it apart from traditional marches.

Miniature Symphony

Thomas Parmeter

Parmeter crafts a three-movement symphony that traverses vast emotional and sonic landscapes. Though titled "miniature," the work's expressive depth and orchestral brilliance evoke epic vistas. The first movement unfolds in a tranquil, verdant soundscape, with lush strings and delicate woodwinds painting a serene pastoral scene that gradually expands to reveal a breathtaking panorama. The second movement shifts to a brooding modality, driven by restless harmonies and relentless rhythms that surge with gripping intensity. The third movement mischievously emerges with two playful duets, then broadens and descends into a fray of furious rhythmic and textural intricacies culminating in a striking moment: a triumphal fife-tune emerges, like a herald of victory, which following more motivic development, finally swells into an uplifting, radiant and grand orchestral chorus.



Superman Returns

John Williams and John Ottoman

Composed for the 2006 film *Superman Returns*, this score draws on the iconic legacy of Williams' original 1978 *Superman* theme. The collaboration between Williams and Ottoman brings a fresh yet familiar take on this beloved superhero.

Heroic motifs and lush orchestration create an emotive soundscape that mirrors Superman's journey and aspirations. The central theme, with bold brass intertwined with strings and woodwinds, evokes courage, adventure and hope. This music honours the legacy of the original films while capturing Superman as a timeless symbol of resilience.




Symphony No. 1

Thomas Parmeter

Symphony No. 1 is a remarkable achievement that showcases Thomas Parmeter's musical maturity and creativity. Across four movements, the work takes listeners on a vivid journey, moving from moments of serene reflection to passages of thrilling intensity, all crafted with orchestration well beyond Thomas' years.

Each movement presents distinct thematic material, often shared and transformed across the orchestra, giving the symphony a strong sense of unity and variety. As a gifted bassoonist and cellist, Thomas has naturally written especially challenging and rewarding parts for these instruments, allowing them to shine.

The symphony's emotional depth is enriched by striking dynamic contrasts and rhythmic vitality. The use of mixed meters, such as 5/8 and 7/8, alongside more traditional time signatures injects energy and unpredictability, while the full palette of orchestral tone colours is explored to great effect.
